The Story

Prologue

An old and eccentric nobleman named Don Quixote, obsessed with stories of ancient chivalry, transforms his servant, Sancho Panza, into a trusty squire and together they set off in search of gallant adventures.

ACT I: The Port of Barcelona

The lovely Kitri seeks out her sweetheart, the young barber Basilio. Their happy meeting in the square is interrupted by her father, the innkeeper Lorenzo, who tries to force her into accepting the marriage proposal of the rich and foppish Gamache. Kitri manages to elude Gamache and together with fishermen, townsfolk and toreadors, she and Basilio join the spirited festivities. Don Quixote and Sancho Panza arrive in the square. The Don is enraptured by Kitri, imagining her to be a vision of maidenly perfection deserving of his noble and knightly protection, and they dance a stately minuet. At the height of the merriment, Kitri and Basilio sneak off followed by Don Quixote and Sancho Panza and with Lorenzo and Gamache in pursuit.

INTERVAL

ACT II Scene 1: A Gypsy Camp

Kitri and Basilio, seeking refuge in the countryside, find themselves in a gypsy camp where they are discovered by Don Quixote, now Kitri's protector, and Sancho Panza. Suddenly the wind gains momentum. The deluded Don attacks a windmill, believing it to be a giant threatening Kitri's safety. Knocked to the ground, he collapses into a deep sleep.

ACT II Scene 2: The Dream

Don Quixote dreams he is in a magic garden filled with beautiful maidens where the Queen of the Dryads brings a grateful Kitri to him. The dream fades and Don Quixote and Sancho Panza continue on their chivalric quest.

ACT II Scene 3: A Tavern

Kitri, Basilio and their friends celebrate their escape when Lorenzo and Gamache arrive with Don Quixote and Sancho Panza not far behind. In the face of Lorenzo's continued determination to marry his daughter to Gamache, Basilio 'commits suicide' in tragic despair. Realizing Basilio's trick, Kitri implores Don Quixote for help. In his pursuit to right a wrong, the Don compels Lorenzo to bless the young lovers before they are separated forever. Instantly Basilio 'comes to life' and he and Kitri triumphantly leave to prepare for their wedding.

Act III: The Wedding

The townsfolk celebrate the marriage of Basilio and Kitri, and Lorenzo accepts Basilio as his son-in-law. Don Quixote gives his blessing to the young couple before he and the trusty Sancho Panza set out once more in search of adventures.

Marianela Nuñez

Argentine dancer Marianela Nuñez is a Principal of The Royal Ballet. She joined The Royal Ballet Upper School in 1997 and the Company in 1998, was promoted to First Soloist in 2000 and Principal in 2002 aged 20. She has performed all the leading roles in the classical, dramatic and contemporary repertory, including in works by Frederick Ashton, George Balanchine, John Cranko, William Forsythe, Jiří Kylián, Kenneth MacMillan, Wayne McGregor, Ashley Page, Jerome Robbins, Liam Scarlett, Glen Tetley, Will Tuckett, Antony Tudor and Christopher Wheeldon.

She has created roles in Infra, Carbon Life, DGV: Danse à grande vitesse, Asphodel Meadows, Human Seasons, Tetractys, Carlos Acosta's Carmen and Multiverse, among other works.

Marianela Nuñez was born in Buenos Aires and began dancing at the age of three. When she was six she began training at the Teatro Colón Ballet School, joining the Teatro Colón company aged 14. She took on corps and soloist roles and toured internationally, both with the company and as a guest artist with Maximiliano Guerra.

Her awards include Best Female Dancer at the 2005, 2012, 2018 and 2022 Critics' Circle National Dance Awards. She received the 2013 Olivier Award for Outstanding Achievement in Dance in recognition of her performances in *Viscera* and in roles created on her in *Aeternum* and '*Diana and Actaeon*' (*Metamorphosis: Titian* 2012). She has appeared as a guest artist with leading companies including Vienna State Opera Ballet, American Ballet Theatre, La Scala Milan, Ballet Estable del Teatro Colón, Ballet Argentino de La Plata and Australian Ballet, and in galas around the world.

Vadim Muntagirov

Russian dancer Vadim Muntagirov is a Principal of The Royal Ballet. He trained at The Royal Ballet Upper School and joined the Company from English National Ballet as a Principal in March 2014. His roles with the Company include Basilio (Don Quixote), Albrecht (Giselle), Prince Siegfried (Swan Lake), Prince Florimund (The Sleeping Beauty), the Prince (The Nutcracker), Colas (La Fille mal gardée), the Girl's Cousin (The Invitation), Young Man (Two Pigeons), Lensky (Onegin), Romeo, Des Grieux (Manon), Jack/Knave of Hearts (Alice's Adventures in Wonderland), Florizel (The Winter's Tale), Don José (Carmen) and in The Vertiginous Thrill of Exactitude, 'Diamonds' (Jewels), The Human Seasons, Symphonic Variations, The Four Temperaments, Afternoon of a Faun, Tchaikovsky Pas de deux and Within the Golden Hour.

Vadim Muntagirov was born in Chelyabinsk, the son of two dancers. He trained at Perm Ballet School before moving to The Royal Ballet Upper School. He graduated into English National Ballet in 2009, promoted to first soloist in 2010, principal in 2011 and lead principal in 2012. His roles with ENB included Apollo, Conrad (*Le Corsaire*), Albrecht (*Giselle*), the Prince (*Cinderella*), Prince Siegfried (*Swan Lake* in-the-round at the Royal Albert Hall), Prince Désiré (*The Sleeping Beauty*) and roles in *Songs of a Wayfarer*. He created the role of the Prince in Wayne Eagling's *The Nutcracker*.

His awards include the 2011 Outstanding Male Performance (Classical) and 2015 Best Male Dancer at the Critics' Circle National Dance Awards and the 2013 Benois de la danse. As a guest artist he has danced with Paris Opera Ballet, Mariinsky Ballet and American Ballet Theatre, in repertory including Solor (*La Bayadère*), and at National Ballet of Japan, Bavarian State Ballet, Mikhailovsky Ballet and Cape Town City Ballet.
